

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

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I've worked in the disability employment policy arena for more than 20 years, and a lot has changed in this time. Looking back, the progress I'm most thrilled about isn't just the policy action we've seen. Rather, it's the significant shift in how we as a nation *talk* about disability and employment.

Today, disability has rightfully taken its place in the larger conversation about workplace diversity. Leading companies are now actively working to align diversity with their corporate brand, both internally and externally. This is because **they know that inclusion works**. They know that groups representing a range of perspectives outperform those with superior, but similar, skill sets. And they know that, as one of the nation's largest minority groups, people with disabilities are an essential voice to have at the table.

Reflecting this perspective, #InclusionWorks will be the theme for National Disability Employment Awareness Month 2016. NDEAM is a nationwide campaign that celebrates the contributions of workers with disabilities and educates about the value of a diverse workforce inclusive of their skills and talents. Although not observed until October, we announce the annual theme each spring to help with advance event planning.

With this year's hashtag theme, we hope to spur individuals and groups to post images and stimulate discussion on social media about the many ways "inclusion works." I'm looking forward to the dialogue!

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I think we'll hear a lot about how inclusion works for workers. I know it certainly does for Adeline Joshua, an information analyst with the U.S. State Department and a Georgetown University School of Foreign Service alumna. Joshua, who has cerebral palsy and uses a motorized wheelchair, credits inclusive youth leadership experiences – especially involvement in Girl Scouts and an internship she obtained through the Workforce Recruitment Program – with laying the foundation for her career success.

I think we'll also see how inclusion works for employers. It does for companies like Northrop Grumman, Lockheed Martin, EY and others on DiversityInc's "Top Nine Companies for People with Disabilities." All of these companies, many of them federal contractors covered by Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act, proudly proclaim disability inclusion to be a core corporate value — because they find doing so helps attract a wider pool of talent. And as the nation's largest employer, the federal government also knows well that *inclusion works*, and is taking steps to increase it by strengthening Section 501 of the Rehabilitation Act.

Finally, I'm confident we'll also see that inclusion works for innovation. It certainly did at Sassy Outwater's workplace. Outwater, who is blind, had trouble applying for a prospective job opportunity due to an inaccessible online application process. With resourcefulness, she completed the process and got the position.



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She then urged her new employer to use her experience as a catalyst for making its technology more accessible across the board. Now, *all* qualified candidates can apply to work for the company. Through TalentWorks, a new tool from the Office of Disability Employment Policy-funded Partnership on Employment and Accessible Technology, we're helping more employers do the same.

These are just a few examples of the many ways #InclusionWorks. This October, we look forward to sharing and celebrating many more. We invite you to keep in touch with us and share what you are planning for NDEAM in your businesses, organizations and communities.

Diwali, also known as the Festival of Lights, marks the beginning of the Hindu New Year.



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17th Annual O'Malley's Weston Irish Festival 1

Friday, Saturday and Sunday October 7, 8, 9th

O'Malley's Pub & Courtyard in historic Weston, MO

Great Irish music, piping, dancing, and storytelling, along with traditional Irish food, drinks and merchandise are what you'll find at the three-day event. The festival features Irish musicians from across the U.S., and Ireland who will perform on the open-air courtyard stage as well as the two indoor pub stages. A fourth stage, adjacent to the courtyard stage, will showcase Irish piping and dancing.

The festival has grown from a single-day event of approximately 1,000 people in 2000 to three days and more than 10,000 guests at last year's event.

The event takes place on the grounds of the Weston Brewing Company, brewers of regionally distributed O'Malley's Cream Ale. The brewery will be providing six hand-crafted beers for this year's event. Irish beers will be available outdoors and in the cellars of O'Malley's Irish Pub.

The headliners include The Screaming Orphans, Barley Juice and KC's own Elders. Local favorites Bob Reeder, Eddie Delahunt, Connie Dover & Tullamore will be onstage along with national acts Chance the Arm, The Three Dollar Band, and Flanningan's Right Hook round out the lineup and more.

Festival hours are Friday - 5pm to midnight, Saturday - 11am to midnight, and Sunday - noon to 10pm. Reduced Rate advanced ticket sales at https://westonirishfest.ticketleap.com/weston-irish-festival-2016/ Gate passes for Friday are \$10, Saturday - \$15, and Sunday - \$15. Children 14 and under are admitted free.



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Halloween Safety Fips

Plan costumes that are BRIGHT and REFLECTIVE.
Make sure shoes fit well and costumes are short enough

stumes are short enouge to prevent tripping.

Remain on well-lit streets and ALWAYS use the sidewalk.

Check treats once you are home.
Though tampering is rare, a responsible adult should closely EXAMINE all treats and throw away any spoiled, unwrapped or suspicious items

Masks can limit or block eyesight, consider non-toxic makeup and decorative hats as SAFER ALTERNATIVES.

A parent or responsible adult should ALWAYS accompany young children on their neighborhood rounds.

Only go to homes with a porch light on and NEVER enter a home or car for a treat.



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No Scaredy Cats (or Dogs) this Halloween: Top Pet Safety Tips

 No tricks, no treats: That bowl of candy is for trick-or-treaters, not for Scruffy and Fluffy. Chocolate in all forms—especially dark or baking chocolate—can be very dangerous for dogs and cats. Candies containing the artificial sweetener xylitol can also cause serious problems.

Wires and cords from electric lights and other decorations should be kept out of reach of your pets. If chewed, your pet might suffer cuts or burns, or receive a shock.


A carved pumpkin is festive, but do exercise caution if you choose to add a candle.

4. Don't put your dog or cat in a costume UNLESS you know he or she loves it (yup, some pets are real hams!).

5. If you do dress up your pet, make sure the costume isn't annoying or unsafe. It should not constrict the animal's movement or hearing, or impede his ability to breathe, bark or meow.

- 6. All but the most social dogs and cats should be kept in a separate room away from the front door during peak trick-or-treating hours.
- When opening the door for trick-or-treaters, take care that your cat or dog doesn't dart outside.
- 8. IDs, please! Always make sure your dog or cat has proper identification. If for any reason your pet escapes and becomes lost, a collar and tags and/or a microchip can be a lifesaver, increasing the chances that he or she will be returned to you.

Mini real or faux pumpkins make fantastic spiders. Just attach pipe cleaner legs to the pumpkins' bottoms and use lentils or beans to create eyes.

Add a drop of black paint for a pupil and white for the highlight in each eye, then let your charming little critters crawl.



Parsnip & Carrot Pumpkin Characters



What you NEED:
Variety of Pumpkins (one for each family
member)
Parsnips and Carrots
Sharp knife and cutting board
Black Craft Foam
Scissors
Toothpicks

Black Permanent Marker
Hats, Sunglasses, and other accessories

- 1. Select pumpkin and parsnip or carrot (for nose) for each family member
- 2. Clean and dry pumpkins, parsnips and carrots
- 3. Cut off Veggie Tops and Insert Toothpicks to attach nose to pumpkin
- 4. Use scissors to cut various facial elements (mustaches, eyelashes from the sheet of black foam)
- 5. Attach foam using hot glue
- 6. Add hats and glasses to customize each pumpkin


